Both are passionate about serving the residents of Morris Plains.

A Morris Plains resident for 27 years, Nancy Verga is a married mother of four and a corporate communicator with a long record of public service in the school, youth, and government organizations of the Borough. After her election to the Council in January 2020, she founded the Borough's Website Committee. The committee redesigned the website in 2021 and launched an online payment system in 2022. Nancy also helped to create the Borough's Business Development Committee, the first of its kind to connect with and support our small businesses while attracting new businesses. The Council appointed her to be its President in 2024. Nancy is currently Chair of the Finance Committee, which oversees the borough clerk, treasurer, attorney, tax collector and tax assessor; the borough's website and its newsletter, *Plains Talk*; elections; and the Morris Plains Library.

Michael Ivey and his wife, Kerri, have been Morris Plains residents for 11 years and have three young children. Mike, an engineer, is currently employed by a Morristown company. He has worked at Picatinny Arsenal and, previously, for a private engineering consulting firm. In Morris Plains, Mike has served on the Green Team and is a Little League coach. Appointed to his Council seat in January, Mike chairs the Public Health, Sanitation and Sewers Committee and is the Council liaison to the Board of Health, the Municipal Alliance, the Teen Center, and the Recycling Committee.

Nancy and Mike will continue to listen to Morris Plains residents, ask the tough questions and advocate for efficiency, transparency, and best practices.
